Dear Friends,

Another month has passed and we can see signs of Spring outside, the blossom and buds, the daffodils and lambs, and the beginning of so much rebirth and new life.

Perhaps we welcome this as hope following the darkness of winter, or see it as joy in our broken world.

In our Politics in the Pulpit episode this week our host, Jacky Embrey, and our guest, Michael Wakelin, were thinking about the readings for Palm Sunday and the story of Easter. Michael was reflecting that we are so used to the cross and the image of Jesus dying, that we are almost desensitised to the pain and agony of crucifixion, we forget how awful it was. We are tempted to go from the jubilation of Palm Sunday to the celebration of Easter without stopping to dwell in the grief, pain and darkness of the events at the end of Holy Week. To truly experience and understand Easter, we must linger in the waiting and the fear.

"My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death," Jesus said to them. "Stay here and keep watch."

Mark 13:34

We can wait in solidarity with Jesus and his disciples, but also with all those who are waiting today and living in unknowns – of asylum seekers waiting to hear a decision on their claim, of people waiting for Universal Credit to appear in their bank accounts, of people on hospital waiting lists, of people in war zones waiting for aid and safety. It is easy to fall asleep to injustices, like the disciples in the garden, who slept when Jesus needed them in his fear and despair. We deny and disappoint Jesus like Peter did, and God knows we will do so, yet loves and forgives us anyway.

As we begin to look toward the events of Holy Week and Easter next week, the culmination of this reflecting and waiting time of Lent, let us not overlook the grief, the pain and the darkness in our haste to reach the celebration of Easter.

As you read about all the things we have been doing and will be doing, I invite you to reflect on who you can wait with in solidarity, and how you can be awake to their pain and suffering.
